À l'OMMC, pas de Vendredi pour tout faire, toutefois, la programmation préliminaire du cours de cette année est tout de même en place. Vous trouverez dans le bulletin la deuxième ébauche de notre programme ainsi que le programme du volet qui se déroulera conjointement à l'ICOMAM (International Congress of Military Arms Museums). Comme vous pourrez le constater, les deux programmes sont principalement axés sur les expositions et les objets qui y sont présentés. Nous commencerons la semaine, ensemble, par des exposés magistraux et des visites au nouveau Musée canadien de la guerre. Les exposés porteront principalement sur le déménagement du Musée et sur la conception et la création des nouvelles expositions.

Dans la partie du cours qui ne concerne que l'OMMC, nous découvrirons quelques nouvelles idées et verrons comment elles peuvent être bénéfiques pour nos membres. La semaine s'annonce instructive et agréable.

OMMC 2005 –REMINDER

The International Congress of Military Arms Museum (ICOMAM) will be holding its annual conference in Ottawa from 13 to 17 June 2005. OMMC 05 will be held in Ottawa at the same time, and the two organizations will meet together at every opportunity. OMMC and ICOMAM will prepare separate and co-joined programmes in order that all members have an opportunity to receive maximum benefit.

OMMC will be staying at the residence at Algonquin College. This residence is the same as in Hamilton as it is managed by the same firm. The suites consist of two separate bedrooms, a shared bath and a small kitchenette. OMMC will also use the classrooms and catering services on campus, as well as the facilities at the hotel where ICOMAM will be arranging their conference. On campus accommodations will be included in the registration fee, and will commence on the Sunday evening and end on the Saturday morning. All members who arrive early or stay late (that is outside this time frame) will be required to make their own arrangements for accommodation either at the college or at a local hotel. OMMC will no longer provide this service.



This is below the gov't rate, and includes complimentary parking (\$11.50/day normally) and high speed Internet. The rooms have recently been renovated and are very comfortable with all the amenities of a suite. Please advise anyone wishing to use this option, that reservations must be made NLT 5 May and use the code "Air Force Heritage and History". Phone number is 1-800-452-5134. The block of rooms is limited so first come, first served, and they will not be held after May 5th.

SHEARWATER AVIATION MUSEUM MANAGER ATTENDS SEMINAR

The Mutual concerns of Air and Space Museums Seminar 2005 moved from its' normal venue in Washington DC to The museum of Flight in Seattle, Washington. This Museum is world class and provided an ideal setting for a very successful seminar.

A recently opened "Personal Courage Wing" provided a spectacular interpretation of both WWI and WW2 aviation. One of the features is an original Italian "Caproni CA-20" WWI Fighter aircraft, claimed to be the first purpose-built fighter aircraft (circa 1914). A Vought F4U Corsair aircraft is featured in the WW2 gallery, as well as in the Great Hall. This was the aircraft type flown by Lt (RCNVR) Hampton Gray when he won his Victoria Cross in the WWII Pacific Campaign. "Hammy" Gray is commemorated in the Shearwater Aviation Museum's Victoria Cross Gallery.

The seminar kicked off on Saturday evening, March 19, with keynote speaker, Mr Walter Gillett, Vice-resident of Engineering and Manufacturing for the Boeing 7E7 Dream liner Program. He presented an interesting presentation on Boeing's efforts to compete with the Airbus 380 for market share.

Mr Bob Ellis, Executive director of the Kalamazoo Air Zoo spoke of their unique, if not controversial, approach to attracting non-aviation enthusiasts. The air Zoo has come up with a new concept in aviation museums that brings history to life through character actors, carnival like rides and full motion simulators right in the Museum, and very little signage or labelling for exhibit aircraft. The aim is to provide a visual and hands-on sensory experience. Quite a departure from traditional exhibit programming.

The Museum of Flight's Restoration Centre is collocated with the enormous Boeing aircraft manufacturing plant in Everett, WA (30 miles north of Seattle). A field trip to this location provided valuable insight into the aircraft restoration process. A tour of Boeing's plant (about 100 acres under one roof) was awesome; we observed several Boeing 747 aircraft at various stages of production. It became obvious throughout the seminar that Boeing is a huge supporter of the Museum of Flight. Don't we all wish we could have a corporate sponsor of this magnitude, both for financial and unkind support?

The assistance of OMMC as a contributing sponsor for attendance at this Seminar is very much appreciated.

VETERANS AFFAIRS MINISTER DELIGHTED WITH CANADIAN FORCES' SHOW OF SUPPORT FOR THE YEAR OF THE VETERAN

Ottawa - The Honourable Albina Guarnieri, Minister of Veterans Affairs would like to express gratitude for the extensive outreach happening during the Year of the Veteran.

On Friday, the Chief of the Defence Staff for the Canadian Forces, General Rick Hillier announced that all Canadian Forces (CF) members will wear a special insignia pin on their uniforms throughout 2005 to recognize the Year of the Veteran. This special pin was designed by Veterans Affairs Canada and includes a Canadian Maple Leaf and a poppy.

"Our Canadian Forces members are among those Canadians to whom we owe a tremendous debt that can only be repaid through active remembrance," said Minister Guarnieri. "By wearing this pin, CF members are honouring those who served before them. It is a symbol of our commitment to them and of our gratitude for the sacrifices they continue to make for our security."

Throughout 2005, high profile ceremonies and events in Canada and overseas will commemorate Canadian veterans and celebrate the 60th anniversary of the end of the Second World War.



LA MINISTRE DES ANCIENS COMBAT- TANTS EST RAVIE DE L'APPUI DES FORCES CANADIENNES À L'ÉGARD DE L'ANNÉE DE L'ANCIEN COMBATTANT

Ottawa - L'honorable Albina Guarnieri, ministre des Anciens Combattants, tient à exprimer sa gratitude à l'égard des importants efforts de sensibilisation déployés pour souligner l'Année de l'ancien combattant.

Vendredi, le Chef d'état-major de la Défense des Forces canadiennes, le général Rick Hillier, a annoncé que les membres des Forces canadiennes (FC) porteront sur leurs uniformes un insigne spécial réalisé par Anciens Combattants Canada tout au long de l'année 2005 pour marquer l'Année de l'ancien combattant. Cet insigne spécial a été réalisé par Anciens Combattants Canada et comprend une feuille d'érable canadienne et un coquelicot.

« Les membres des Forces canadiennes comptent parmi les Canadiens envers lesquels nous avons une dette immense que nous pouvons seulement rembourser par voie du souvenir », a déclaré la Ministre Guarnieri. « En portant cet insigne, les membres des FC rendent hommage à ceux qui ont servi avant eux. Il s'agit d'un symbole de notre engagement envers eux et de notre gratitude à l'égard des sacrifices qu'ils continuent de consentir pour assurer notre sécurité ».

Tout au long de 2005, des cérémonies et des activités d'envergure se tiendront au Canada et outre-mer afin de commémorer les anciens combattants canadiens et de célébrer le 60e anniversaire de la fin de la Seconde Guerre mondiale.

"THE VALIANTS"

After much discussion over the years a decision has been reached on the installation of memorials to some of Canada's greatest war heroes in Confederation Square, in Ottawa, a site adjacent to the National War Memorial. Five statues and nine busts will be placed on the Square near a flight of steps to the Rideau Canal. The five statues are representative of five major conflicts in Canadian history.

Pierre Le Moyne d'Iberville represents the early wars, while Joseph Brant fought American rebels in later years. The War of 1812 is commemorated by a statue of Charles-Michel de Salaberry. One of the two women honoured is Georgina Pope, a nurse who served with distinction in the Boer War. The quintet is completed by the addition of Sir Arthur Currie from the First World War. The busts, in historical order, depict Le Comte de Frontenac, Colonel John Butler (whose inclusion may upset some American visitors), Sir Isaac Brock, Laura Secord, Corporal Joseph Kaeble VC, Merchant Navy Captain John Wallace Thomas, and Victoria Cross winners from the Second World War Captain Paul Triquet, Warrant Officer Andrew Mynarski and Lieutenant Hampton Gray.

Explanatory texts will be written in English and French. Unveiling is scheduled for November 2005.

IMAGES OF A FORGOTTEN WAR : FILMS OF THE CANADIAN EXPEDI- TIONARY FORCE IN THE GREAT WAR

The National Film Board of Canada is fulfilling its goal to increase public access to the NFB collection, with three innovative Web spaces: CineRoute, Documentary Lens and Images of a Forgotten War. These micro-sites accessible through the NFB Web site <www.nfb.ca> offer an extensive collection of films, archival footage and educational resources.

The new site on World War I, **Images of a Forgotten War** <www.nfb.ca/ww1>, is an indispensable tool for anyone seeking a better understanding of history and Canada's role in the Great War. Rare footage filmed by the Canadian Expeditionary Force is the foundation of the site. In addition, texts written by top World War I experts will help visitors understand the films and provide context for this exceptional footage from the early 20th century. The rich collection of archival material was inventoried by the NFB in co-operation with the Imperial War Museum in London, England, the National Archives of Canada and the Canadian War Museum. Research and implementation for these new Web initiatives was made possible with the support of the Department of Canadian Heritage through Canadian Culture Online.

The NFB's new Web site on World War I, is an indispensable tool for teachers, researchers, students and anyone seeking a better understanding of this important part of our history.

Rare audiovisual archives now available to the public
The National Film Board of Canada created this site in order to give the public access to Canadian Expeditionary Force footage documenting Canada's participation in World War I. An initial research phase begun in 1999 determined which of these films were already available for consultation around the world. In co-operation with the Imperial War Museum in London, England, the National Archives of Canada and the Canadian War Museum, the NFB conducted a comprehensive inventory of these visual archives, which were found to constitute a collection of 193 titles. In 2003-04, a process of digitizing, encoding, cataloguing and indexing the materials was undertaken, leading to the launch of the World War I Web site presenting 20 of these sequences. In 2004-05, another 60 titles were added to the new Web site and the films were grouped into three main categories: Building a Force, War Time and Postwar Period. Another 60 will be added in the coming year.

The first category is made up of films showing the emergence of a Canadian military force. They include recruiting, training, parading and embarkation scenes filmed in Canada, along with some scenes shot in England. The second

Le site s'appuie sur des films du Corps expéditionnaire canadien, qui documentent la participation canadienne à la Grande Guerre. Des textes rédigés par de grands spécialistes de la Grande Guerre enrichissent la compréhension des documents et aident à mettre en contexte un métrage exceptionnel datant du début du 20e siècle. La riche collection d'archives visuelles a été constituée en collaboration avec le Imperial War Museum de Londres, Bibliothèque et Archives Canada et le Musée canadien de la guerre. La recherche et la mise en œuvre de ces nouvelles initiatives Web ont bénéficié de l'appui du ministère du Patrimoine canadien par le biais de Culture canadienne en ligne.

De rares archives audiovisuelles à la portée de tous
L'ONF s'est donné comme objectif de rendre accessible des films documentant la participation du Canada à la Première Guerre mondiale. Une première phase de recherche, entamée en 1999, a consisté à répertorier le matériel déjà offert à la consultation dans le monde. En collaboration avec le Imperial War Museum de Londres, les Archives nationales du Canada et le Musée canadien de la guerre, l'ONF a effectué un inventaire complet de ces archives visuelles formant une collection de 193 titres. En 2003-2004, un travail de numérisation, d'encodage, de catalogage et d'indexation des séquences du Corps expéditionnaire canadien (CEC) a été entamé menant à la mise en ligne d'un site, La Première Guerre mondiale, présentant 20 de ces séquences. En 2004-2005, 60 titres

category contains footage of Canadian troops in battle, as well as footage on aviation, the war effort in Canada, activities of different Canadian corps in support of the military objectives in Europe, and troop activities behind the lines. The third category consists of films from the postwar period, showing activities of the Canadian troops after the armistice and the soldiers' return to Canada.

Texts written by top Canadian World War I experts will help users understand the films and provide context for this exceptional footage from the early 20th century. Background elements (photos, posters, diaries, letters, poems, maps and plans, articles of various sorts, links to Web sites, bibliographical resources and biographies) round out this source material and facilitate its use. Educational resources are also provided to enable teachers to make immediate use of the site content in the classroom.

INGRAM 'READY FOR ELECTION FIGHT'

In the United Kingdom, Armed Forces Minister Adam Ingram has said he is ready to do battle with a Save the Scottish Regiments candidate in the general election. Mr Ingram said that such challenges were in the nature of democracy. Former Scots Guardsman Allan Hendry intends to contest Mr Ingram's East Kilbride seat in protest at the merger of Scotland's regiments.

The minister confirmed that all the Scottish regimental museums would not be closed as part of the plans. "I would like to absolutely refute the rumour that the Ministry of Defence has decided that the regimental museums in Scotland are to be scrapped," he said during a visit to the Royal Highland Fusiliers Museum in Glasgow. "That is not the case at all, the infantry museums are part of Scotland's proud heritage."

Responding to Mr Ingram, Save the Scottish Regiments said his assurances on the safety of the museums were "nothing more than pre-election rambling". A spokesman said: "The fact of the matter is that the MoD pays staff salaries and funds the upkeep of the regimental headquarter buildings. "The suggestion from the MoD is that if museums want to go it alone, they'll have to find the money themselves, which of course the majority could not. "This suggests us to that no final decision has been taken and that Adam Ingram's assurances on the safety of Scotland's six historic museums are nothing more than pre-election rambling by a minister who has already proven he does not care for the saving of Scotland's proud military heritage. "Unfortunately, his words of assurance are empty."

Save The Scottish Regiments plans to endorse opposition candidates in nine seats. Anne McMillan, whose father served in the Black Watch, is standing against the Chancellor, Gordon Brown, in the Kirkcaldy and Cowdenbeath constituency. Friday also saw the disbanding of 206 Squadron, one of three based at RAF Kinloss, as part of the military rationalisation.

Mr Ingram thanked the Royal Highland Fusiliers for their work in Basra and southern Iraq for six weeks in the run-up to and during the elections. Corporal Stephen Devlin, 32, from Irvine, said: "We provided security escorts for rations going into the city. "It was good to help the Iraqi people achieve democracy. I would have no problem if I was asked to go back tomorrow."
